| $\times 1000$ | digits move LEFT 3 spaces | $\div 1000$ | digits move RIGHT 3 spaces |

## Bus Stop Division

$964 \div 7=137$ r 5

## 137 r 5 <br> 7 <br> $9^{2} 6^{5} 4$

How many 7's in 9? 1 (put at top)
remainder 2 (put before 6)

How many 7's in 26? etc...

## Don't forget you can also use the Bus Stop method to find:

Decimals... (the original remainder, 2, forms the '20' when you add a 0 at the bottom)
$142 \div 4=35 \cdot 5$


Fractions... (the original remainder, 2, is put on top of the divisor to form a fraction - which can be simplified)

## Chunking Division

## $73 \div 5$ How many 5 s make 73 ?

$$
\begin{aligned}

&-\frac{50}{23}(\underline{10} \times 5) \\
& \frac{-20}{3}(\underline{4} \times 5)
\end{aligned}
$$

How many 5 s have been subtracted?
14 sets of 5 , with 3 left over.

Adding Fractions with Unlike Denominators $\frac{1}{8}+\frac{2}{3}$
$\begin{aligned} \begin{array}{r}\text { Rewrite with common } \\ \text { denominator }\end{array} & 3 \times \frac{1}{8}+\frac{2}{3} \times 8 \times 8\end{aligned}$

Add the numerators

$$
\frac{3}{24}+\frac{16}{24}
$$

## Subtracting Fractions

$\frac{11}{15}-\frac{3}{5}=?$
$\frac{11}{15}-\frac{3 \times 3}{5 \times 3}$
$\frac{11}{15}-\frac{9}{15}-\frac{11-9}{15}=\frac{2}{15}$

The bottom number (denominator) of each fraction must be the same before you can do the calculation, so...

What you do to the top you do to the bottom
What you do to the bottom you do to the top

## Ordering Decimals

- Write all numbers out again in columns
- Make sure the decimal points are lined up
- Fill in gaps with a place holder (0)
- Compare and order - it is now far easier to do


## BODMAS

This is in what order we do a calculation...


$$
\begin{aligned}
& 3+(2 \times 4)=3+8=11 \\
& 4+6 \times 5=4+30=34
\end{aligned}
$$
